Geostrategic change – Worsening Security Situation

- Geopolitical change and great power competition leads to a lower degree of predictability in the international system.
- Climate change leads to more human activity in the Arctic.
- Interaction between geopolitical change and climate change leads to a new Arctic region.
- Sweden's northern and northwestern neigbourhood is affected.



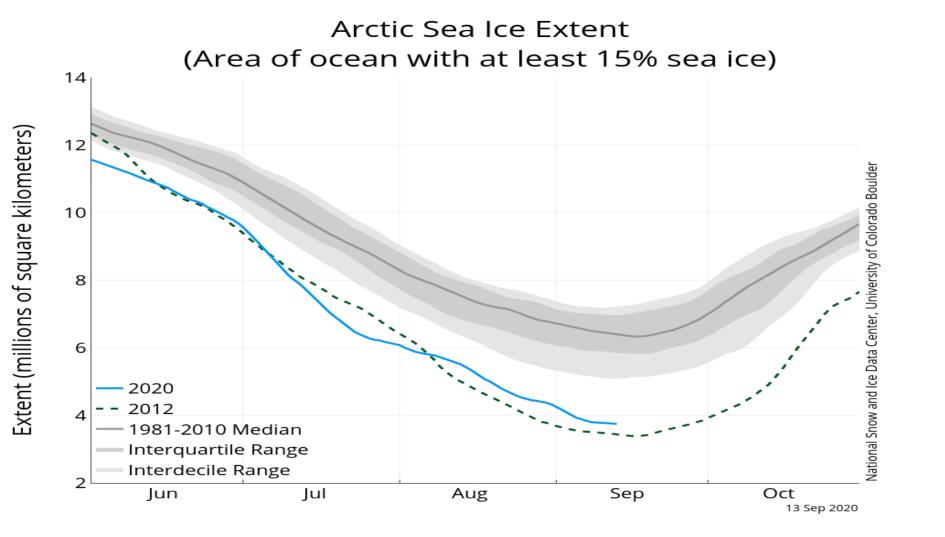

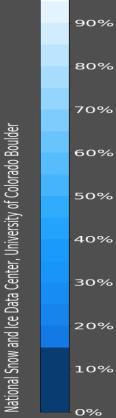

Inter-state cooperation for Arctic affairs: the Arctic Council.

- From "bottom-up" to "top-down".
- The AC has been upgraded:
 - A budget
 - A secretariat
 - Better communication efforts
 - New and binding agreement on search and rescue and protection from oil spills.
 - Six new states with permanent observer status in 2013 (PRC, IT, SING, JAP, IND, ROK) EU's is pending.
- Role of observers?
- Limits in mandate?
- Other formats "A5", bilateral? Where to discuss security issues?
- A glass ceiling for the AC?

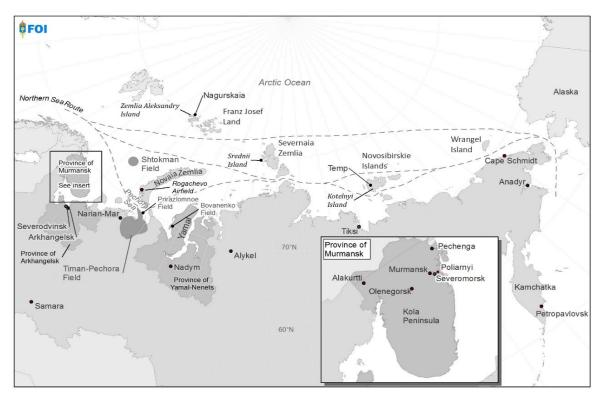

Russia – striving for a great power role 1(2)

- Strategic seclusion from the west:
 - Inner repression, outward aggression.
 - Control over territory in peace, crisis and war.
 - Long lines of history used instrumentally.
- Well-developed knowledge base for operating in the north.
- A fifth strategic direction in the north driver for activity:
 - Strategies for shipping, energy and security.
 - Military build-up. New bases, excercise pattern, more units, C2-arrangments.
 - Offensive posture.





Russia – striving for a great power role 2(2)

- High North and Kola Peninsula base complex: Strategic Nuclear 2nd –strike capability central and existential:
 - Maintaining strategic parity with the US to the utmost.
 - "Cylinder of interest" reaches far into Sweden, Finland, Norway and adjacent seas.
 - "Nuclear Bastion" enables power projection south into the North Atlantic.
- Northern sea route and Kola Base complex seen in the same context.
- Energy and mineral extraction, LNGexport makes SLoC's central.
- Can all plans be fully implemented?

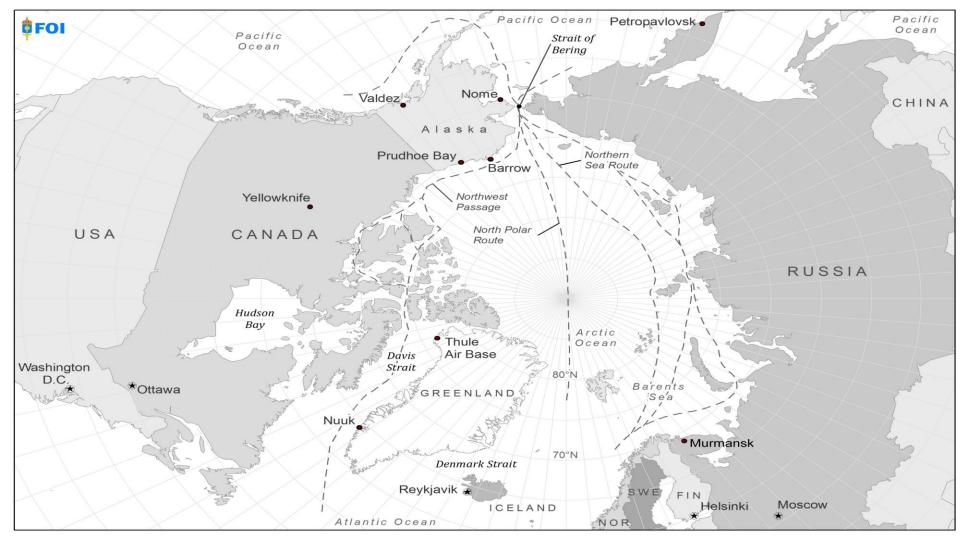
China in the Arctic – The New Black

- Strong growth in power. Authoritarian power with global ambitions. Long-term actions supported by coordinated strategy.
- Arctic strategy since January 2018: "A
 Near Arctic Power". Actions in the region
 are to generate rights.
- A search for footholds: Greenland, Norway, Iceland, Sweden. Similar methods as in Africa, The Pacific etc.
- China-Russia relations: A marriage of convenience or the beginnings of a real alliance? "The Polar Silk Road".
- The Law of the Sea: One policy for the Arctic and a different one for the South China Sea.



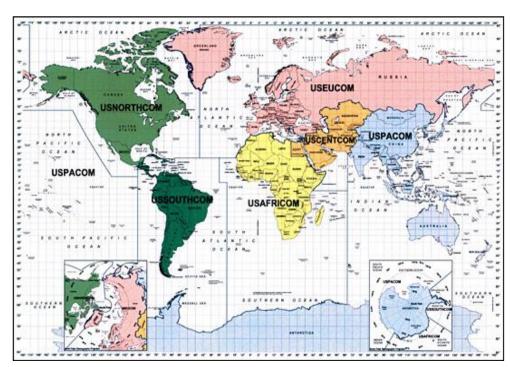
Chinese icebreaker Xuě Lóng 2, operational from july 2019. Built in China, designed in Finland.





USA – Arctic policy under change

- Slow policy development in the past decade, faster pace in recent years.
- Improved Arctic knowledge-base in the US.
- Strong domestic policy polarization affects decision-making.
- Realization that the Arctic cannot be left to Russia and China acts as driver for policy development.
- Breakthrough for a more active policy: New icebreakers, top-level policy statements, presence, exercises, C2-arrangements etc.
- Key areas:
 - Freedom of Navigation: global or regional?
 - Climate Change Accepted or not?
 - Energy- and mineral extraction, Law of the Sea and military strategy.
 - China-Russia Arctic relations.

Sweden's Arctic and Nordic Neigbourhood: Northern Scandinavia and the North Atlantic

- Russia aims for a no-go zone in the north to protect its nuclear capabilities.
- Russian ambition leads to a "new" situation in the High North and the North Atlantic.
- Opportunities for RU power projection south into the North Atlantic. SLoCs and telecomcables.
- Russian-Chinese actions in the region. Joint or parallell?
- The western powers: US Navy 2nd fleet, Nato JFC-NF, exercises, operations, basing. Resource allocation?
- Limited nordic rearmament and increased biand multilateral security cooperation.
- Risk of balkanization of the N Atlantic region: Greenland, Scotland, and Faroe Islands.
- Northern Ireland: A new version of "the troubles"?
